



FLORIDA DEEPWATER HORIZON RESPONSE WEEKLY UPDATE

November 14, 2012

Gulf Coast Incident Management Team/Florida Branch

- Gulf Coast Incident Management Team (GCIMT) remains active in New Orleans, LA with the Florida Branch Office located in Mary Esther, FL.
- Supporting the GCIMT is Darryl Boudreau (FDEP), State On-Scene Coordinator (SOSC), and George Henderson (FWC), State Scientific Support Coordinator (SSC). George staffed the GCIMT office this week; Darryl provided remote support.
- Representatives from the U.S. Coast Guard (USCG), FDEP and BP are staffing the Florida Branch Office.
- The Florida Branch, is supervising the activities of two Divisions, staffed by BP and their contract personnel with USCG oversight:
 - Division 1 - Western Escambia County (Perdido Key)
 - Division 2 - Eastern Escambia (Pensacola Beach), Santa Rosa, Okaloosa and Walton Counties.

Florida Activities

- Two Shoreline Cleanup Assessment Technique (SCAT) teams, that include FDEP personnel, continue to conduct scientific assessments of the FL coast on a daily basis. Teams document oil found and provide cleanup recommendations.
- Product continues to be collected, documented and weighed by segment on a daily basis.

Florida Activities continued

- Macondo Well- a National Response Center (NRC) report was filed on November 9th, for a sheen observed around the well head. The CG has directed BP to deploy a Remote Operated Vehicle (ROV) to investigate. The ROV will look at the cofferdam, riser pipe, wellhead and rig debris. Due to rough seas, the investigation will likely be postponed until after the Thanksgiving holiday.
- The Gulf Islands National Seashore, Perdido Key subsurface delineation project was completed on 11.09.12.
 - Perdido Key areas delineated this week:
 - FLES1-022: AOI A- NOO
 - FLES1-024: AOI A & B- NOO
- A meeting has been scheduled on November 29, 2012 in Ocean Springs, MS to discuss the path forward for National Park Service segments in Mississippi and Florida.
- The new 'Surge' schedule for Perdido Key and Pensacola Beach began on November 12th.
- Due to the lack of work, SCAT team 9 will be standing down effective November 21st, leaving one full time SCAT team working in Florida. The need for Team 9 will be reassessed at the beginning of January 2013.
- Reviewed and provided input on the Shoreline Clean-up Completion Plan, Segment Advancement Process. A modified process is being drafted and will be distributed early next week.
- Worked with NOAA and the CG to develop a simple format to review NRC call outcomes. Of particular interest to Florida are segments that have been returned to the response and/or an OSRO team dispatched to clean an area.
- Agreed upon SOSC SCAT repeat requests: FLES1-080- repeat MON (1), FLOK2-001 and FLOK2-002- repeat SIR (2).
- Received and acknowledged six Walton County Directive SIR (2) packages for FOSC removal from the response- FLWA1-026, FLWA1-027, FLWA1-029, FLWA2-024, FLWA2-025 and FLWA2-027. The FOSC has not signed the packages.
- The State approved the following document(s)/plan(s):
 - Shoreline Inspection Report (SIR-(1)) - for segments FLES2-044 and FLES2-046. These segments met shoreline cleanup criteria and in accordance with the SCCP will be transferred into SCAT monitoring for a minimum of 30 days prior to conducting a second SIR (SIR-(2)).
 - Shoreline Inspection Report (SIR-(2)) - for segments FLES3-002 (NPS-eastern portion) and FLES3-017. These segments met shoreline cleanup criteria and will be removed from the response.
