Pellicer Creek Paddling Trail Trip Planning

Overview: The unspoiled pine forests of Faver-Dykes State Park and the 1,500-acre Princess Place Preserve make for scenic access points for this calm stream. More than 100 bird species, including colorful warblers, can be spotted during the spring and fall migrations. Eagles and falcons return to nest each year, and resident herons, egrets and wood storks can be seen year round. Both freshwater and saltwater fish can be caught in the stream.

Counties: St. Johns / Flagler

Nearest town: St. Augustine

Mileage: 1. Mile 0--Faver Dykes State Park
2. Mile 0--Princess Place Preserve (Reservations Required)

Trip length: 6.7 miles round trip

Difficulty: Easy

Skill level: Beginner

Access Point 1 Put-in: Faver-Dykes State Park

Nearest town to put-in: St. Augustine, FL

Miles from put-in: 16

Directions to put-in: Take Interstate 95 to exit #92 which is US 1. Go north on US 1 for 300 yards and turn right on Faver-Dykes Road. Go 1.5 miles on Faver-Dykes Road to Faver-Dykes State Park.

Access Point 2 Put-in:

Nearest town to put-in: St. Augustine, FL

Miles from put-in: 19

Directions to put-in: From I-95, take Exit #298 (Old Exit 92) to US 1 south. Take US 1 south into Flagler County and to Old Kings Road (approximately 1.5 miles). Old Kings Road is an unpaved grade road and is well marked on US 1. Turn left on to Old Kings Road. Continue on Old Kings Road to Princess Place Road (approximately 1.5 miles). Turn left on to Princess Place Road.

Take-out: Round trip paddle

Nearest town to take-out: Same as put-in.

Expect at parking: Faver-Dykes State Park

- **Parking fee:** State Park Entrance Fee
- **Bathrooms:** Available at boat ramp
- **Hours of operation (gates close):** 8:00 am to sundown
- **Camping:** Available at State Park
- **Camping fees:** Yes
- **Crowds:** Possible in summer
- **Boat Ramp:** Available only for small boats and canoes. Small paved ramp with dock.
- **Potable water source:** Available at State Park
- **Canoe/kayak launch:** Use paved ramp

Expect at parking: Princess Place Preserve (optional take-out or put-in)

- **Parking fee:** None
- **Bathrooms:** Portables
- **Hours of operation (gates close):** Wed-Sunday 7:00 am – 6:00 pm
- **Camping:** Available through permit from Flagler County Parks and Recreation
- **Camping fees:** Free with permit
- **Crowds:** Possible in summer
- **Boat Ramp:** Several dirt or gravel launches are located within the Preserve.
- **Potable water source:** Available in park.
- **Canoe/kayak launch:** Several small launches are available throughout the park.

Cultural and historical features along the trail:

Pellicer Creek, once called Woodcutters Creek, was at one time home to a large timber mill. The remnants of an old bridge associated with the timber era are still visible between I-95 and US-1. Pellicer Creek was used to haul timber and turpentine out to the Mantanzas River and onward to St. Augustine. The creek is named for Francisco Pellicer, an early Spanish resident of the area and owner of a large and prosperous plantation.

Notes:

The Princess Place Preserve is a 1500-acre tract managed by Flagler County Parks and Recreation. This area features a variety of recreation opportunities including hiking, picnicking and camping. Canoe rentals and launch are available but it is recommended that those seeking to rent canoes call ahead. The optional two mile paddle on Pellicer Creek between Faver-Dykes boat launch and the Princess Place Preserve is somewhat wider and prone to winds.
